


Since its inception, Yad Vashem has been charged with the sacred mission of preserving the memory of each of the six million victims of the Shoah.



For the family and friends of the murdered millions who lack a gravesite of their own, the yearning for a spiritual resting place, a physical place of commemoration for their loved ones, is elemental. In addition to collective sites and acts of commemoration, Yad Vashem's Memorial Cave offers survivors, relatives and friends of those who survived or perished during the Holocaust a way to commemorate individuals and communities.



Overlooking the Jerusalem Hills, in the heart of the eternal capital of the Jewish people, the Memorial Cave provides a space for reflection and quiet contemplation; for a moment of personal remembrance.



Over 1,000 memorial plaques have been dedicated to individual survivors and victims, to entire communities, families and groups.



In order to accommodate this overwhelmingly powerful need to commemorate individuals, Yad Vashem is expanding the current Memorial Cave to provide an additional 90m² of commemorative space and an additional entrance.



The Australian Friends of Yad Vashem have set aside a wall within the expanded Memorial Cave which will serve as an eternal memory for victims and survivors of the Shoah. Plaques will be of a uniform size, $30 \times 30 \text{ cm}$, and can be dedicated with a donation of \$1,800.



In the event that the number of names to be commemorated do not fit on a standard 30×30 cm plaque, the following options exist:

30 x 45 cm	\$2,500
30 x 60 cm	\$3,600
